International Conference, Acre Israel - 14-15th June 2022

The International Academy of Practice with Alienated Children will hold its inaugural conference in Acre, Israel in June 2022. [Dr Jamie Amparo Alves](#) earned a Ph.D. and a Master Degree in Social Anthropology & African Diaspora Studies from the University of Texas at Austin and a B.A in Journalism from the Universidade de Ribeirão Preto. Before the current appointment at the University of California, Santa Barbara, he taught Cultural Anthropology and Latin American Politics at the College of Staten Island of the City University of New York and Anthropology of (Post)Conflict/Anthropology of War in the Center for African Diaspora Studies at Universidad Icesi. He was also a postdoctoral researcher at the Africana Research Center (Penn State) and at the Faculdade de Ciências Sociais/Unesp-Araraquara. Dr Alves's arena of activism includes public journalism, prison/police abolition, and racial justice in Brazil, Colombia and the United States. As a freelancer journalist, he has collaborated with alternative media outlets including The Black Agenda Report, Open Democracy, LaSillaVacia, Adital, Observatorio da Imprensa, Jornal Brasil de Fato, among others. Assaults on NHS workers and police cause huge harm and have lasting effects on staff morale, absences and retention. But are harsher punishments effective in reducing violence and abuse?

Join Transform Justice and an online panel of excellent speakers for the launch of new research which questions whether a more punitive response is effective in reducing abuse towards emergency workers. The research highlights the unintended consequence of harsher sanctions: sweeping more people with mental health conditions, cognitive impairments and/or who are neurodiverse into the criminal justice system.
